how will attitudes evolve?



"I am all too aware that these [homophobic] laws were often put in place by my own country. They were wrong then and they are wrong now." Theresa May to Commonwealth country leaders, 2018

"I used to go into Middlesbrough quite a lot and it was just quite a deprived town ... there's =not a lot of LGBT stuff going on there. When I was growing up, quite a lot of what I thought LGBT was, it was based down south in London and there was no LGBT community allowed elsewhere." **Josh, Just Like Us ambassador**

how is our understanding of issues facing the LGBT+ community growing and evolving?

"So, growing up gay was even more difficult because I am literally a minority within a minority within a minority. I'm an ethnic minority obviously being brown, I'm Indian, and then, within that, I was raised in a Muslim family, and there's not many Indian Muslims out there. And then, within that as well, I'm also gay." Sam, Just Like Us ambassador

"And when I was a bit older, and I was ready to come out to my friends as transgender, I was really scared. Even though I was in a friend group that was mostly lesbians and bisexual women Because there was that separation between the LG B and the T, and people don't talk about transgender people as much as it was okay to talk about lesbians and bisexual women."
